

Winchester home again

Jesse Winchester, a singer-songwriter and draft evader pardoned by President Carter, will perform in concert on the University of Alabama campus Sunday.

He will be featured prior to the Jimmy Buffett performance. The concert, which is being sponsored by the New Alabama Union, will be held at 8 p.m. in Memorial Coliseum.

Tickets will be \$5 for UA students; \$6 for the public and \$7 on the day of the show.

Winchester attended Williams College in Massachusetts and graduated in 1966 with a B.A.

degree in German. While in high school he started playing music first as a drummer, and later as a piano player and continued this throughout his college years.

At the height of the Vietnam war, he went to Canada rather than be drafted. He started working with a musical group in Canada, but soon quit and began playing as a solo artist, writing and singing his own songs.

His first album in 1970 included such songs as "Yankee Lady," "Brand New Tennessee Waltz" and "Biloxi."

Albums following have included "Third Down, 110 to Go," "Learn to Love It," and "Let the Rough Side Drag."

Although he has played to Canadian audiences on a number of coast-to-coast tours, this is his first concert tour in the United States.
